# People of the Two Row April and Kelly: Cooks of the Covenant Chain

Ediotrs' note: The Two Row Wampum Renewal Campaign is a statewide education and advocacy campaign inspired by this year's 400th anniversary of the first treaty between the Haudenosaunee and Europeans. The treaty outlines a mutual commitment to friendship, peace and living in parallel forever. A campaign focal point is a symbolic enactment of the treaty, with Native people and allies paddling side-by-side down the Hudson River.

April Tarbell and Kelly Edwards, two women from the Onondaga Nation, will be sharing their love (and well organized method) of cooking for several Two Row Campaign events. Kelly participated in the trial run for the symbolic enactment last summer, and April has cooked on a grand scale for a variety of gatherings, such as the Healing of the Waters in Minnesota. They both described the considerations of organizing to take care of large groups, especially when it involves sustaining paddlers.

Kelly and April are used to it, they say, "We both cook for our ceremonies. April goes on the road and cooks when our people take trips... we have to think of every little detail!" And there is a lot to think about when you anticipate cooking for 200 people for two weeks; but they are determined to provide nutritious and delicious meals every day. The menu includes venison and corn

stew, a lot of hot scones, spaghetti, greens, and "American food"
—like hot dogs and hamburgers. "We've added some vegetarian
dishes, too!" they stated at an enactment meeting in February,
"but we know our people have to get their meat!"

From the trial run, the group discovered a lot of things they didn't initially consider, such as the need for a significant supply of sunscreen and bug spray, clotheslines, and weather procedures. April and Kelly are part of the Ground Crew committee, which includes traveling ahead of the group to set up for meals and paddlers' campgrounds, along with clean up; they asserted, "we aren't going to be cleaning camper's dishes!" The enactment committee is trying to be as green as possible, with biodegradable soap, mess kits, and reusable water bottles on the gear list.

Kelly and April are aware they must expect the unexpected while traveling down the Hudson. Aside from self-care and food portions, they shared stories that are symbolic to the spirit of the Two Row. They recalled many people greeting them who had read about the trip in newspapers and who were kind enough to share their local knowledge of the areas. Kelly emphasizes the purpose of the trip from the Onondaga perspective, "We are always told that you don't turn people away. We aren't about that. And who knows, they might have something to offer too."

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



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## JIM RICHARDSON



As a photographer for National Geographic Magazine and contributing editor of TRAVELER Magazine, Jim Richardson has stood on the tops of volcanic peaks and ventured below the surface of swamps and wetlands. When he is not circling the globe, you will probably find him in his gallery, Small World, on Main Street in Lindsborg, Kan., where he displays his stunning photographs that chronicle small town and rural Kansas life. Richardson has photographed more than 25 stories for National Geographic, including "Our Good Earth" and "The Death of Night." ABC News Nightline produced a story about the long process of assembling National Geographic coverage by following Richardson in the field and at National Geographic Society headquarters in Washington, D.C. His audiovisual presentation, "Reflections from a Wide Spot in the Road," has toured internationally. A 22-page story about his 30 years of photographing life in the north central Kansas town of Cuba, population 230, was published in National Geographic and featured twice by CBS News Sunday Morning, most recently in May 2004. His 1979 study of adolescence, "High School USA," is now considered a photo essay classic and is used in college classrooms.

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# **War Update**

**Syria:** An alleged hacked British defense contractor email reveals a US/Qatar plan to deploy a chemical weapon false flag attack in Syria.<sup>1</sup> Israel conducted an air strike on Syria; the US reportedly approved and is poised to carry out similar strikes.<sup>2</sup> The US has given the rebels \$50 million.<sup>3</sup> Four million Syrians are in need of humanitarian assistance.<sup>4</sup>

Ethiopia: In December, Ethiopian paramilitaries renewed attacks on communities in Ogden<sup>5</sup> in an ongoing campaign to clear the land for resource extraction. The Ethiopian government's army and paramilitaries have used rape, torture, and murder to drive communities into Internally Displaced Person camps where they are starved. There are currently 3.7 million people in need of assistance and over 1.5 million without food or water.<sup>6</sup> As many as 1 million Muslims peacefully protested on February 7 demanding freedom of religion and release of political prisoners; journalists attempting to cover the protests have been detained and protestors oppressed.<sup>7</sup> The UK has recently provided training and funding directly to the paramilitary forces<sup>8</sup>; the US provides up to \$600 million yearly in aid to Ethiopia<sup>9</sup> which is diverted to the military and paramilitary.<sup>10</sup>

**Somalia:** The US recognized the UN appointed<sup>11</sup> government of Somalia. US troops have operated in Somalia since 1992;

Somalia has been under a US funded occupation since the overthrow of the Islamic Courts Union in 2007. First the Ethiopian military, and then the African Union army, destroyed tens of square miles of densely populated areas to crush the resistance and clear the land for mineral and energy exploitation. Millions of displaced Somalis are now starving in refugee camps. The separatist Putland government has ordered the execution of political opposition leaders and fired upon peaceful demonstrations. The appointed federal government is not opposed to separating Somalia into smaller states.

Mali: The Malian military has committed extrajudicial killings of northern residents. <sup>16</sup> Over 412,000 people have fled Mali, and five million have been affected by the fighting. <sup>17</sup> The French and Malian military, with US military support, have re-captured N. Mali, but French bombings continue to batter the guerilla insurgency. <sup>18</sup> Tuareg rebels sought independence in the 1960's at the purported end of French colonial rule; Tuareg rebellions in 1990 and 2008 challenged the right of French uranium mining companies to poison their land in neighboring Niger. <sup>19</sup> French Special Forces have deployed to protect uranium mines in Niger, and US troops and drones are to be deployed on the Mali border. <sup>20</sup>


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### DAVID HENRY HWANG



Throughout his career, Tony Award-winning playwright and screenwriter David Henry Hwang has explored the complexities of forging Eastern and Western cultures in a contemporary America. He is best known as the author of "M. Butterfly," which ran for two years on Broadway, won the 1988 Tony, Drama Desk, John Gassner, and Outer Critics Circle Awards, and was also a finalist for the 1989 Pulitzer Prize. He is also author of the award-winning plays "Golden Child," "Yellow Face," and "Chinglish," as well as several books for award-winning musicals. According to Opera News, Hwang is America's most-produced living opera librettist. He is also executive producer of the feature film "White Frog," which is currently in production. Hwang has been awarded numerous grants, including fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Guggenheim and Rockefeller Foundations, the New York Foundation for the Arts, and the PEW Charitable Trust. From 1994-2001, Hwang served by appointment of President Clinton on the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities. He has also been honored with the 2012 William Inge Distinguished Achievement in the American Theatre Award.



# Activist Appreciation: Marge Rusk

Marge Rusk has been sharing her time and talents at the Syracuse Peace Council as long as most of us can remember. For at least a few decades she's come into the office on a weekly basis to help out wherever she can, and she frequently helps with the *PNL* mailings as well.

Marge connected with SPC during the late 1950s through the annual Institute for International Relations. Since then, she's been part of our efforts to end the Viet Nam War, fight nuclear power, oppose US intervention in Latin America, the Middle East and elsewhere, and to support the rights of all people. She is also active with Syracuse United Neighbors.

Many people have passed through SPC while Marge remained a steady and consistent figure. A thoughtful story teller and avid bird watcher, Marge provides an important link to SPC's pre-digital age. Marge is in the office almost every Wednesday afternoon, sharing a meal with the staff, keeping the plants alive, making us laugh, and helping us all feel just a little more connected.

#### United as One

Four activists spoke to the Onondaga County Legislature on February 5 demanding independent oversight of the county jail, known as the Justice Center. We believe justice will be served only when needless deaths at the hands of correctional officers stop forever.

Speakers addressed the apparent pattern of correctional officer misconduct, stressing that current oversight structures are insufficient. United as One hopes to have a much stronger presence at the next County Legislature meeting on March 5 at 1 pm (401 Montgomery St., Rm 407). United as One will demand community participation in any new oversight mechanism and let the Legislature know that we'll be paying attention.
